


World population living in extreme poverty, 1820 to 2015




Share of people living in extreme poverty




































How has COVID impacted children globally?

- Millions of children have been shut **out of school** for over a year in some cases. Many of these children, especially girls will never return.
- UNICEF estimates that up to 10 million more girls will be forced into early marriages. While we had been seeing real progress in addressing child marriage- going from 1 in 4 to 1 in 5 girls globally being married as children, this progress is being reversed
- Violence and the abuse of women, girls and boys has increased significantly in many countries, as lockdowns and movement restrictions have given vulnerable people no where to escape from their abusers
- Recalling the real progress we have made reducing extreme poverty, the
 recession created by the pandemic is so many contexts may lead to the first
 increase in those numbers for years- with perhaps 150 million people falling
 back into extreme poverty
- Hunger and even famine is on the rise- it was already increasing in the 2
 years before the pandemic, but now is rising even more- the WFP says that
 the number of people in urgent need of food aid has doubled to 270 million
 people.



Climate: What is happening?

- CoP26: Conference of Parties to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC)
- Glasgow, UK November 1-12
- Postponed from 2020
- May still be postponed or may become of "hybrid" event, with a limited number of delegates
- Pre-CoP Youth Summit in September alongside final pre-CoP negotiation conference in Milan, end of September

What are children saying?

- Children and young people have been leaders in the global climate change movement
- We met with 121 boys and girls from 10-17 in 12 countries: Bangladesh. DRC. Brazil, Nicaragua
- They see very clearly how climate change is affecting their communities
- "Talk less and act more"
- We are not passive victims- we want to be agents of change
- 95% said they would take personal action
