

What Has Been Happening at HAC Lately?

There has been so much going on since our last newsletter that we're excited to share with you. First off, in the fall we made some changes to our staff team. Emily Taylor, now Riegert, expressed a desire to step back from full-time work and is now our part-time Assistant Program Director. As a result of that move, Josh Penfold shifted from focusing on Outdoor Education and now oversees all of our programs as our full-time Program Director. And, because both Josh and Emily live



off-site, we welcomed Cassie Zehr back to camp in a new 8-month contract

position called the Summer Camp Director. Cassie will live in the apartment in the basement of the Red Staff House and support Emily and Josh with running summer camp. We also welcomed CC Weber back to camp in the fall to run our weekly CLASP program and she will be working with us over the next 18 months to develop our new LINC (Learning IN Community) programs. You can read more about these new programs on the next page. And, finally, we welcomed Kelsey Heska who has occasionally been helping our housekeeping staff this winter and spring. We are thankful that these changes and additions to our staff team have gone smoothly and for a great staff team who genuinely enjoys working

together each and every day. In February and March, we ventured into new outdoor education territory offering winter programming to local schools for the first time. With funding from the Government of Canada's Community Services Recovery Fund we were able to purchase forty five sets of snow shoes, broomball

equipment for twenty four players, outdoor skills gear, and new storage sheds. With all the gear and programs in place we were excited to welcome our first groups of students. There was only one piece to the puzzle missing that was unfortunately out of our control...the weather. While we didn't always have great winter conditions, it didn't stop us all from having a lot of fun. Whether it was converting outdoor shelter building into an indoor architectural challenge, or abandoning orienteering because of winter lightning storms or snow-less snowshoeing, the staff, teachers and students were



resilient and found ways to make the less than ideal situations great opportunities for learning and fun. With one season of winter programming complete we look forward to seeing what next winter will bring.

And lastly, since November, we have received four estate gifts totalling over \$78,000. We are so thankful that they are leaving a lasting legacy at Hidden Acres. We have put two of the gifts to use already, one helped us pay off our mortgage on the Woodhouse Retreat Centre and the second helped us complete the renovations to the basement of the Brown Staff House. The renovations were needed after water damage was discovered in the basement and repairs were made to the foundation. The renovations included finishing the den and converting some of their storage area into a bedroom.

Continue reading on to see more updates on other programs that happened at camp as well as many of the ways that volunteers and organizations supported Hidden Acres since the fall.


Grandparent & Grandchild Day

New Programs Coming to Hidden Acres

Since 1962, Hidden Acres has served youth and young adults with special needs in its programs. Our mission drives us to create safe and welcoming spaces and programs for diverse groups of people and CLASP (Community, Life And Skills Program) and SYAC (Supported Young Adults Camp) are examples of this as they help young adults with special needs connect and learn life-skills all while having loads of fun! In March, we received a generous grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (you can read more about the grant on the last page) to support us in expanding the programs we offer these young adults. Our SYAC program won't change but CLASP will get a new name and will be included in the new programs all called LINC (Learning IN Community). The new structure looks like this:







We are really excited that CC Weber has committed to developing these new programs. Stay tuned for more details in the coming weeks and months.
